Mark Levin

ome people walk into a library and see books, but on a fateful day in 1972 as he perused *Craft Horizon* and some other magazines at the Kent State library, Mark Levin saw his future—in a photo of a Wendell Castle table.

"I didn't know who he was at the time," Levin recalls, "but I made a decision right there and then to go into woodworking, pre-med be damned."

These days Levin's own tables are winning national awards, including a NICHE Award two years in a row, but his career path hasn't been as direct as he had pictured. Pre-med gave way to architecture before Levin returned to his home state to study at Northern Illinois University. There he worked with Bobby Falwell, who had done graduate study under Castle's supervision. Further primed to launch into woodworking full time, Levin met resistance from his father, who insisted he finish a

degree. After graduating, Levin spent a decade in the Chicago area in his own studio, developing a lucrative office furnishings line. A one-year break turned into 11 years of working in sales for a woodworking supply company, "learning from a businessman's businessman," mentor Alan Baer.

"I first see myself as a businessman who makes a living woodworking," Levin says now. In 1996 he returned to his art and soon pursued it and love to New Mexico, where he has been since 1997, marrying sculptor Melinda Morrison.

Levin continues to draw inspiration from libraries, though. From his own extensive collection of books, he often selects five or six and "absorbs"

the images. "I just flip them very fast as if you're programming a computer—just to get an idea. If something catches, I look a little longer."

For his part, he wants to convey that humans are

capable of imagining and creating objects as beautiful as anything found in nature, "be it a piece of furniture, a building or a car."
